

## **GROWING JUSTICE FUND AWARDS NEARLY \$5 MILLION TO 38 COMMUNITY-LED INITIATIVES SUPPORTING VALUES-BASED GOOD FOOD PURCHASING**

*38 grants found community alliances, local and Tribal producers, food distributors, and food businesses reaching children, families, and communities.*

[February 2, 2026] – For the 2025 grant cycle, the Growing Justice Fund awarded a mix of **Planning Grants and Implementation Grants**, with grant amounts ranging from **\$10,000 to \$250,000**. These investments support projects that strengthen engagement with **community-serving anchor institutions**—including schools, hospitals, and elder care facilities—that hold significant purchasing power and can drive meaningful economic and social benefits for historically marginalized communities.

“The 2025 Growing Justice Fund grantees reflect the strength, creativity, and leadership of communities building food systems rooted in equity and self-determination. These 38 organizations are advancing values-based purchasing in ways that center community needs, honor cultural foodways, and create lasting pathways for economic opportunity. The 2025 grants align with the Growing Justice Fund’s **three priority areas**:

- **Infrastructure:** Building and strengthening systems that enable equitable food purchasing, including support for historically disadvantaged producers, food hubs, and institutional partnerships.
- **Policy and Organizing:** Supporting grassroots organizing, educational policy advocacy, and capacity-building efforts that align institutional food purchasing practices with community-defined priorities.
- **Traditional Food Pathways:** Advancing food sovereignty within Tribal Nations by supporting traditional foodways, local food economies, and community-led approaches to Native food systems.



The 2025 grantees are advancing a wide range of initiatives—from expanding food hubs and forging new partnerships with anchor institutions to advocating for policy change and strengthening Tribal food sovereignty—collectively contributing to a more equitable and resilient institutional food system.

*"Resources from the Growing Justice Fund will enable us to evolve nearly 15 years of Good Food procurement efforts in Los Angeles by strategically aligning policy, practice, and capital across the supply chain.
